Francis Cotton:

I expect our Friend and
(your) Relative Thomas Ball, may not
now be able to write to his Relatives in
Tasmania; as his health seems good, but
age has crept on, and he has been obliged
to give up his Situations, as Doorkeeper
to the meetings; but as he was a very useful
and industrious, attentive Man on those
large Premises. Friends! we granted him
a trifling pension: he now lives with his
son, in the Stoke Newington Road, and

I trust greatly enjoys the change. I saw him this morning but had not opportunity to speak to him, he seems in good health. Sister Mary was recently here for a little change, and some returning home, I think has written twice informing us that she is favored with good health. Our Nephew I think is getting on quite as well as he hoped in his business. The strike in the Pottery, Iron, and mining trades near him has at times caused a dulness, which we hope may not occur again. I hear the "Board of Works" are likely to make a New Street, thus our meeting House at Westminster. I have not had a visit from our Nephew this year, but his Master went to see him, and as he went on excursion trips to Liverpool, and to the Isle of Man in summer, as his Master left him, he considers he cannot now well leave home. Mr. Palmer from Sydney in England, was 4th months on the passage. Anna Maria unites with me in love to you all (including Dr. Stone) - My affectionate Brother
