Nov 13, '09 Past 4 O'Clock in the afternoon

because I thought proper to correct my
daughter, Sarah, for a fault the
evening before, Dec 4, brought before
a Body of Magistrates, Messrs. H.
L and C being held in confinement
from my children tell that honest
The, Thos D, B, and G, Porter Setters
offered bail for me which was refus-
ed, The same day was sentenced to
receive 500 lashes by Lt. Col. Collins ordered
for denying Ch. P. Proclamation and
because I would not acknowledge
any Person but H, E, W, B, Esq as the
Just in Chief, without a legal cause
for changing my opinion, but owing to the

distressed state of mind I laboured under from being confined 27 Days from, my motherless Children, I was rendered incapable of receiving but 50 lashes, and was afterwards held in confinement till Monday the 15th of January, 1809, when I was brought upon the H. and H. and D. ship after being confined for 10 Weeks, wanting 1 Day, during which time was prohibited from speaking to any person, but my Children, and during my unfortunate confinement my Daughter Elizabeth was reduced by H. Officers who in information I did not receive till the 9th of Feb in the Evening 1809 the other induction took place upon me after my confinement by Dr. Morris 29th Jan, James had a bust that obliged me to apply to Dr. Dr. Dr.

and to keep him in the Guardhouse with me till I was liberated Jan 3rd sailed his Majesty's ship Porpoise for Port Jackson, with his E W B Capt the next day my children was locked out of the House I was allotted in Mrs. Abrahams when my Children Kitty Susan and James was obliged to lay in the Guardhouse, with me, 10th application was made to me for my Daughter Kitty by E Edington through the channel of Mr. Mitchell for her to live at Govt House to nurse his Daughter young child, when I denied his going, which was the means of prolonging my confinement till the 15th, as says^t Davis told me that the Govt meant^t release me that day, only that I denied him my Daughter, Jan 15th 1810 arrived the Extra summa from Mr. Macmillan £10, Dispt
