HOBART MATERNAL & DORCAS SOCIETY

The Hobart Maternal & Dorcas Society was formed in 1835 by a number of charitable ladies, firstly "to assist married women during the time of their confinement" and secondly "to extend relief to the poor, as funds admit, especially to children who may be in want of suitable clothing to attend the enfant, Sabbath or other schools". Boxes or bags were prepared containing clothing and blankets for the baby and mother, and soap and a bible. The bags were lent for a month, but food and other comforts were distributed as funds allowed. After the maternity Bonus Act of 1912 the Society more or less went into abeyance, except for special cases, and in 1949 it was finally wound up. A brief history of the Society by W H Hudspeth was published in 1942 and is with the records (ref : RS1/11).

DIARIES OF T. & J.M. HUDSPETH.

Thomas Hudspeth, born in 1761, was a surveyor and school master at Bowsden, Northumberland, U.K. In 1791 he married Alice Fox-Maule. Some time after 1822 he, together with four of his eight children, Elizabeth, Catherine, James and Alexander, joined his eldest son John Maule at 'Bowsden', Jericho, V.D.L.

John Maule Hudspeth, 1792-1837, after medical training undertook work as ship's surgeon, finally with the Hudson Bay Company in 1815. In 1817 he started practice in Bowsden, married Mary Lowrey, an old school mate in 1819 and emigrated to V.D.L. in 1822. He had an appointment as Assistant Colonial Surgeon but his major interest was his farming property 'Bowsden'. Six of his children survived infancy. (Profile of a Pioneer, by W.H.Hudspeth. RS.3/4/1(1) and <u>Hudspeth</u> Memorial Volume, 1954).

Diaries, entitled 'hemerologium' written at 'Bowsden', Jericho. Entries from 9 Jan. 1848 are in different hands. A pencil note added to the last page of the last volume reads 'Grandfather Hudspeth's Journal dictated to Elizabeth and Catherine, A.C.P.' Entries are fairly detailed accounts of the daily life of the family and includes references to visits of neighbours such as the Harrisson and Pike families. The last entry (17 Aug. 1849) notes: 'This being the 88th anniversary of my birth.....' (N.B. Hemerologium = Gk. daily account) 8 volumes.

WILFRED HUGH HUDSPETH

W.H.Hudspeth (1874-1952) son of Rev. Canon Francis Hudspeth and grandson of John Maule Hudspeth (1792-1837), graduated B.A. at Melbourne University and was called to the Tasmanian Bar in 1898. He practised for 30 years in partnership with N.E.Lewis and Tetley Gant. For many years he served on the Council of the Royal Society. His papers consist of notes on various aspects of the history of Tasmania and drafts of articles, written mainly between 1935 and 1951

TURKISH BATH CO.

Presented to the Royal Society by G.A.Roberts, 1946

HOBART TOWN TURKISH BATH CO. LTD.

1866-1892

The establishment of a Turkish Bath Company for Hobart Town was promoted at a public meeting held on 25 October 1866. 200 shares of $\pounds 5$ each were sold. The chairman of the Directors was Alfred Kennerley, later succeeded by Henry Llewellyn Roberts. The first secretary was W.G.Elliston. Land at the corner of Harrington and Collins Street (south side) was purchased from Mr Adcock for £400 in 1867 and adjacent land with two houses purchased from Moses Cohen in 1874. The building was designed by Henry Hunter and with fittings etc., cost about \pounds 1500. The baths were opened to the public in September 1868 (two days a week for ladies and 4 days for men). The company was wound up in 1892 and the premises sold. The buildings were finally pulled down in 1933.

JEMES BACKHOUSE WALKER

FAMILY PAPERS 1812 - 1872

William Clark (1769-1851) arrived in Tasmania in 1824 and settled near Bothwell at Cluny, and later acquired other property on the River Jordan at the Hunting Ground, later called Mauriceton.

He had formerly served in the British army, was taken prisoner by the French in 1812. In 1821-1823 he served in South Africa but when his regiment was ordered to India he sold his captaincy to retire to Van Diemen's Land, as his health would not stand an Indian campaign.

William Clark and his wife Ann (nee Elphinstone) had five sons and two daughters: Thomas Noble (1793-1853), Jane (1795-1873), Ann (1797-1868), William (1799-1825), George (1801-1827), Charles (1803-1833), John (1807-1852). Four of the sons followed their father into the army. William jr. and his wife Isabella (daughter of Thomas Berdmore) both died of yellow fever in Jamaica in 1825 leaving an infant son, William Sydney, who also died before he could be brought back to his Berdmore grandparents. George died in India at the age of 26 in 1827 and Charles was drowned in October 1833 in the wreck of the "Lady Munro" on this way from India to join his parents in Tasmania.

John Clark (1807-1853), the youngest son, came with his father to Tasmania and was Keeper of the Bonded Store in Launceston, Coast Waiter and Searcher at George Town and Police Magistrate at Hobart, Launceston, George Town and later Bothwell He returned to take over the management of Cluny in 1838. He married Jane Eddie but had no children.

Jane the elder daughter came to Tasmania with her father from South Africa on the "Adrian". She did not marry but was governess to the children of Lieutenant-Governor Arthur and later lived with her father. Mrs Ann Clark and the second daughter, Ann, came from England in the "Phoenix" to join the family. Ann married in 1826 William Pritchard Weston (1804-1888) of Hythe, Longford, who had arrived in Tasmania in 1824. W.P. Weston was a member of the Royal Society of Tasmania. He opposed transportation and became a member of Parliament, serving as Premier for brief periods in 1857 and 1861. He spent his later years in Victoria where he died in 1888. William and Ann Weston had two sons, Edward Dubrelle (1831-1877), who married Kate Macarthy Clerke, and Maurice (1834-1895), who married Marie Elizabeth Wilmore in 1864, and five daughters: Madeleine Dubrelle who married John Guthrie in 1850;), who married Joseph Archer in 1852; Aimee (d. 1861) who married Ann (1832-James Carstairs; Fanny who married Edward Morrah of the Bank of Australia and New Zealand in 1858; and Emma Blanche who was born in London in 1840. Ann (Clark) Weston added Dubrelle to her eldest children's names as the Clark family claimed to be be descended from a French Huguenot family called Dubrelle who settled in Ireland in the 17th century. Edward Weston inherited Cluny but left it in common to all his children, so the property was leased and eventually sold. Edward's eldest son was William Dubrelle (d. 1946, a solicitor of Law, Weston and Archer of Launceston) and his eldest son Edwin Dubrelle Weston donated to the Queen Victoria Museum, Launceston, some papers of the Weston family and a portrait of W.P. Weston.

The William and John Clark Papers are an interesting record of a settler family. They include papers concerning the management of the Cluny property, a few papers relating to Bothwell and John Clark's correspondence concerning his work as a magistrate. There are also letters to John Clark from William Barnes (1791?-1848). brewer of Launceston, 1829-1839; Matthew Curling Friend of Newnham, Port Officer at George Town, 1833-1841, and from Charles Arthur (1808-1884), nephew of and Aide-de-Camp to Lt.-Governor George Arthur, 1827-1829. There are also letters from British army officers' wives and daughters addressed to Jane Clark.

In 1843 the road from Hamilton and Elderslie (marked and gazetted on 10 June 1836), which joined the main Launceston road at Cross Marsh and also went on to Picton and Apsley, had been stopped by A.F. Kemp of Cross Marsh where it crossed his property. These roads were used by all the local farmers taking stock and produce to the Green Ponds or Oatlands markets and by several tradesmen and small landholders living in the area and also by Mr Otter the Green ponds chaplain and by a dissenting minister who conducted Divine Service for up to 50 people in William Clark's barn on alternate Sundays. Considerable inconvenience and even hardship had been caused and subsequently summonses were taken out against T.F. Gorringe and A.F. Kemp.

B JOHN CLARK

John Clark (1807 - 1853) arrived in Van Diemen's land with his father from South Africa in 1824. His father acquired a grant of land for him on the Jordan river at the Hunting Ground. From March 1829 - March 1830 he was Keeper of the Bonded Store at Launceston. He was appointed to the Commission of Peace in February 1830 and in April he was already acting as magistrate in George Town as the stipendiary Assistant Police Magistrate there had been removed. On 1 May John Clark received the appointment of Landing and Coast Waiter and Searcher at George Town, a paid appointment worth £300 a year. In addition to the duties of clearance of vessels and customs, he was directed to be responsible for keeping a record of prisoners at the settlement and to pay special attention to the female House of Correction, as the Lieutenant-Governor had doubts about the Superintendent, and the education of the children of the settlement. Such matters were normally the responsibility of the resident Police Magistrate and on 7 May 1830 John Clark was directed to take up his station in George Town, there being no resident magistrate since Captain D'Arcy had been removed. From May - December 1835 he was Assistant Police Magistrate in Hobart and in January 1836 he was appointed Police Magistrate in Launceston as William Lyttleton was returning to England. He was also appointed a coroner on 2 May 1836.

In 1838 William Clark, John's father, conveyed his property, Cluny, to his son in return for annuities for himself and his wife and daughters and at the end of the year John Clark returned to Bothwell to run the property. He continued to act as a justice of the peace and coroner in Bothwell and got involved in a dispute between some Bothwell inhabitants and the Assistant Police Magistrate Major Charles Schaw of Schawfield. Later he was also in dispute with another A.P.M. Samuel Barrow and with a fellow Bothwell justice of the peace Rev. Wigmore.

In February 1839 John Clark married Jane Oswald Sinclair Eddie (1820-), niece of John A. Eddie of Launceston. After his death in 1853 his widow returned to Scotland. A child had been born but did not live.

Most of John Clark's financial affairs were handled by the Bank of Australasia (Charles S. Henty) in Launceston, including some of the wool trade and J.S. Butler of Hobart also acted as agent for the overseas wool trade.

Other regular correspondents and friends included Charles Arthur, William Barnes and Matthew Curling Friend.

Charles Arthur (1808-1844), nephew and ADC of Governor George Arthur, had become acquainted with John Clark before the latter went to Launceston as Store Keeper and the two carried on a fairly lively correspondence, both being in their early twenties. Charles Arthur afterwards settled at Longford and married Mary Allen daughter of Thomas Reibey of Entally.

William Barnes (1791?-1848), a friend of Clark, was a brewer who settled in Launceston about 1824 and established the Port Dalrymple Brewery and grew hops at South Esk. His nephews Thomas Manifold and Thomas Wilson joined him in 1827 and other Manifolds later. In 1835 Barnes offered to sell the brewery to Tom and John Manifold. Wilson committed suicide in 1835. Barnes was appointed a justice of the peace in 1828. He was a director of the Cornwall Bank and the Bank of Australasia and had properties Trevallyn and Plaisance (Kelso). He married Anne Jane Sharland a teacher, in 1830 and they had a son, William 1832-1898).

Matthew Curling Friend (1792-1871), a lieutenant in the Royal Navy, settled in Tasmania at Newnham in 1832. He was appointed Port Officer at Launceston in 1832 and George Town in 1834 during the years when Clark was Police Magistrate there and they seem to have been on very friendly terms and Friend and his wife, Mary Ann (died 1838), corresponded with Clark. Friend retired to England in 1852.

COAST WAITER AND MAGISTRATE GEORGE TOWN

John Clark was appointed to the Comission of the Peace in February 1830 and was already acting as magistrate in George Town in April. The Assistant Police Magistrate at George Town, was transferred and not replaced by another stipendiary magistrate. On 1 May 1830 John Clark was appointed Landing and Coast Waiter and Searcher at George Town, a paid appointment worth £300 a year. In addition to the duties of clearance of vessels and customs, he was directed to be responsible for keeping a record of prisoners at the settlement and to pay special attention to the female House of Correction and the education of the children of the settlement. Such matters were normally the responsibility of the resident Police Magistrate and on 7 May 1830 J.C. was directed to take up his station in George Town, there being no resident magistrate since Capt. d'Arcy had been removed.

COAST WAITER GEORGE TOWN

Appointment as Coast Waiter 1830

Appointment as Coast Waiter and Searcher, George Town (1 May 1830) and additional instructions (19 July 1830). Complaints about Magistrate Schaw July 1838 - 1841

F JANE CLARK

Jane Clark (1795-1873) was the elder daughter of William Clark and brother of John Clark. She had joined her father at Cape Town, South Africa, where he was serving with the army and came with him and her young brother John to Tasmania in the "Adrian", the same ship on which the new Lieut-Governor Colonel Arthur and his family travelled. The Arthur family were army friends of the Clark family and Jane became governess to the Arthur children. She did not marry and lived most of her life at Mauriceton, Green Ponds.

DERWENT BANK AND CHARLES SWANSTON

The Derwent Bank was established in 1827 and opened for business on 1 January 1828 in Davey Street, Hobart, with a staff of two, the cashier Stephen Adey and the accountant John Leake of Rosedale, Campbell Town. William Henry Hamilton was appointed managing director in 1830 but retired in 1832 and was replaced by Charles Swanston (1789-1850), a former Captain in the Indian Army. Swanston also carried on business as an import and export agent in wool, tea, sugar, rum, etc. The bank failed in 1849 and John Walker, merchant and mill owner of Hobart, acted as liquidator. These letter books were found with the papers of John Walker in the mill buildings formerly occupied by him in Barrack Street, Hobart (see also Walker papers RS.20). Another Swanston letter book is in the State Library of Victoria, and accounts of receipts + journants 1835-1840 - Stude Archiver NS.37/6

ROBERT KNOPWOOD

Robert Knopwood (1763 - 1838) was ordained in 1799 and was the first clergyman to serve in Tasmania. He sailed with David Collins' expedition to Port Phillip in 1803, transferring to Van Diemen's Land in 1804. He lived at'Cottage Green' in Battery Point and also had property at Clarence Plains (Rokeby). He kept detailed dimries, most of which are in the Mitchell Library Sydney (see also RS.11, 12, 14, 15)

KNOPWOOD DIARIES

Rev. Robert Knopwood (1763-1838) kept a fairly detailed and lively diary most of his life. According to Miss Mabel Hookey (1871-1953) some of the diaries were purchased at the sale of Knopwood's effects by her grandfather George Stokell (? d. 1874 aged 86) of Rokeby House, Rokeby. These covered the years 1801 - 1804, 1805 - 1808, 1814 - 1820, They passed to Stokell's 1822 - 1834 and 1836 - 1838. daughter, Henrietta, who gave the first volume (1801-1804) to her brother George whose daughter Alice sold it to the Mitchell Library. The others were given to Mabel Hookey who kept the second volume (1805-1808) but sold the other three volumes to Angus & Robertson, who re-sold them to the Mitchell Library. The Royal Society of Tasmania had microfilm copies made of the diaries in the Mitchell Library of Knopwood's life in Tasmania (from 7 Feb. 1804) and the diary owned by Miss Hookey (see RS.15.) Miss Hookey later bequeathed the diary in her possession (1805-1808) to the Royal Society.

A transcript of this diary (1805-1808) made by W.H. Hudspeth, was published in <u>Papers & Proceedings of the Roy. Soc. of Tas.</u>, 1946 & 1947. See also M. Hockey, <u>Bobby Knopwood in his times</u>, Hobart (Fuller) 1929, and The Chaplain, being some further account of the days of Bobby Knopwood. Hobart (Fuller's Book Shop) [1970]

Diary of Rev. Robert Knopwood 1 Jan. 1805 - 17 Jul. 1808

The diary is headed 'Revd. Robert Knopwood, Chaplain, Hobart Town, Derwent River, Van Diemens Land'. It begins on Tuesday 1 January 1805, noting 'a general muster of all the prisoners in the colony it being New Years Day'. It is written in a neat hand, some words being abbreviated. Knopwood notes, for example, dining with the Governor and others, visiting the Government Farm, kangaroo shooting, fishing, the shortage of provisions in the colony, the weather, the arrival and departure of ships, occasionally christenings, etc. etc. Some pages have been cut out leaving only the days (probably by R.K.)

FRANKLIN PAPERS

See George Mackaness, Some private correspondence of Sir John and Lady Jane Franklin (Tasmania 1837 - 1845), Sydney (1947) for published transcripts of these papers, although Mackaness omitted parts, particularly of Lady Franklin's letters.

These papers, and other Franklin papers, were owned by Willingham Franklin Rawnsley, a relative of Sir John Franklin, and used by him for his biography of Lady Franklin: *Life, diaries and correspondence of Jane Lady Franklin 1792 - 1875*, London (1923). The biography includes some quotations from letters and diaries but not complete transcripts. After the book was published he presented some papers relating to Tasmania to the Royal Society of Tasmania (some other papers were given to the National Library, Canberra).

Many of the papers are only copies (some with omissions), not original, as, according to Rawnsley, after Lady Franklin's death her niece and companion, Sophia Cracroft, selected some papers for publication and had illegible ones copied or extracted and the originals were destroyed. The copies or extracts have been corrected and edited.

Sir John Franklin (1786-1847) was Governor of Tasmania from 1847 until 1843. He is also remembered as a naval officer and arctic explorer. He was knighted for his second arctic exploration of 1824 - 1828 but died on an expedition to find the North-West Passage in 1847. He married Jane Griffin (1791-1875) in 1828, his first wife Eleanor having died leaving one child Eleanor. Jane Lady Franklin was interested in education and the arts and endeavoured to establish in Tasmania a college (Christ College), girls school and museum and art gallery. She was also interested in Elizabeth Fry's work to reform women convicts.

A few other Franklin papers, from other sources, are also held by the Royal Society (RS17, RS18). Other papers are in the Scott Polar Research Institute, England (microfilm copies in the State Archives Office of Tasmania), the National Library, Canberra, the British Museum, and the Gell Papers, Derbyshire, England.

JAMES ERSKINE CALDER

J.E.Calder (1808-1882) arrived in V.D.L. in 1829 as assistant surveyor and had a distinguished career as surveyor and explorer, being appointed surveyor-general in 1859. JOHN WALKER (1799 - 1874)

John Walker was a miller, brewer and merchant who arrived in Hobart in 1822. He built a flour mill at Richmond and later in Launceston. He bought the Government flour mill in Barrack Street, Hobart. He was also a general merchant and banker and acted as liquidator to the Derwent Bank, wound up Governor Arthur's estates, and acted as trustee to others. He was an elder of the Scots Presbyterian Church. (See A.D.B. vol. II) (See also RS., 9, 39, \clubsuit , 114). JOHN STOKELL DODDS (1848 - 1914)

J.S.Dodds, whose parents settled in Tasmania in 1853, was a judge∳politician. He became attorney-general, post-master general, and chief-justice (1898). He represented Tasmania in conferences in other colonies and was also interested in education, art & literature. He served on the Council of the University of Tasmania and was Chancellor 1907-1914. He raised subscriptions for troops for the Boer War. He was awarded C.M.G. in 1889, K.C.M.G. in 1901. These papers consist of official circulars, invitations and programmes.

LEONARD RODWAY

BOTANIST

Leonard Rodway (1853-1936) CMG, dentist and botanist was born in Devon, England, son of Henry Barron Rodway, dentist, and Elizabeth (Allin). He trained in the training ship "Worcester" and served at sea for three years before studying to be a dentist at the Middlesex Hospital, London. He qualified in 1878 and migrated to Brisbane where he married Louisa Phillips. They settled in Hobart in 1880. Rodway practised as a dentist and also acted as dental surgeon to the Hobart General Hospital. He devoted his spare time to botany and preparing a catalogue of Tasmanian plants. He published The Tasmanian Flora (Hobart 1903), Some Wild Flowers of Tasmania (Hobart 1910), Tasmanian bryophyta (Hobart 1914-16) and contributed many papers to the Royal Society of Tasmania to which he was elected in 1884. He was Honorary Government Botanist from 1896 - 1932 and established a Herbarium in 1928. He was a trustee of the Botanical Gardens 1911 - 1928 and then Director of the Gardens. He was lecturer in Botany to the University of Tasmania 1923 - 1929. He was also a foundation member of the Tasmanian Field Naturalists Club and a leader of its bush excursions. He received the CMG in 1917

Six volumes of manuscript notes and drawings on Tasmanian plants, with some enclosed correspondence with well-known botanists, were given to the Royal Society (originally part of the Rodway Memorial Library).

The Eucalyptus, of which you sent specimens, dear Mr Rodway, is of great interest, and was named at the Melbourne Meeting of the Australian Association E. Perriniana, as then Mr Perrin formerly forest administrator of Tasmania exhibited living and dried plants. It holds the same position to E. Stuartiana, which also [in its *deleted*] occurs occasionally in an ashy grey form, as E. Risdoni to E. Amygdalina, and as E. Cordata to E. Urnigera. The anthers are narrow ellipsoid, not as in E. Risdoni kidney shaped. I should like to get some more specimens for critical examination, particularly also fruit quite ripe. What is the nature of the bark and the height of the tree?

While reconstructing with my diminished means my Department, I have had very little time to work descriptively on plants, but your Galinia which needs comparison with several New Zealand species and which meanwhile I named G Rodwayi, shall soon also have attention.

The Coprosma sent by you, dear Mr Rodway, is C. Petrei Cheeseman, which I showed some time ago from specimens [of *deleted*] sent by Mr J.B. Moore from Mt. Tyndall, to extend from N.Z. to Tasmania. It is one of the very few blue fruited species of this genus, and your observations on the bisexuality of the flowers prove furthermore the correctness of my view in uniting Nertera with Coprosma into one genus.

Have you lately heard from Mr Moore and Mr Fitzgerald? I have not.

Am not much surprised, dear Mr Rodway, that the blue-fruited Coprosma proved distinct from the genuine species of which I had no good specimens to compare. I think that I ought not to be <u>excluded</u> from the final elucidation of this plant as Mr Moore confided it in first instance to me. Indeed in my description of <u>fruiting specimens only</u> (R.S. Tasm. 17 Aug. 1891) I said pointedly that the flowers might prove the plant distinct from C. Petriei, and that in such a case the plant ought to be called C. Moorei. What I now suggest therefore, would be that it be so named under our joint authority, and if you will write some descriptive notes [descript<u>ions altered</u>] and forward some flowering specimens I will <u>finish</u> off by additional remarks, so that together with Mr Petries observations [remarks *deleted*], this Comprosma can be brought as <u>confirmed</u> now before the next meeting of the R.S. of Tasm. The ambiguity of C. Petriei even in N.Z. has not yet been cleared up for I feel quite convinced that the supposed red fruited state does not belong to the genuine species.

Always regardfully your Ferd. von Mueller I can send some few other notes on Tasm. plants to the R.S. there for the next meeting. When will that be?

As you rightly assumed, dear Mr Rodway, the Leptorrhynchos sent by you is L. nitidulus.

When collecting myself this species in the then wilds of Gippsland, fully $\underline{40}$ years ago I recognized it as the Candallean plant and as such it appears printed in my large Report to the Vict. Parliament in 1854 already. Steetz already in 1844 distinguished L. linearis from L nitidulus. To make quite sure, I sent a specimen of the Gippsland plants (which is identical with yours) to Alph. D.C., asking him to compare it with his father's original specimen of L. nitidulus, and the result was a declaration of identity.

Simultaneously I asked Prof Aschersen in Berlin to reexamine the original specimen of Lessing's L. Conearis, and - as predicted by me - he declared it also a form of L. squamatius.

I fear you lost all faith in me for help. But the plants of the Elder Exped. took up much time (700 species), the Bailey intrusion (now happily overcome) upset me much in calm work, the reduced means of the Department - gradually to be regained - retarded work also, on systematic subjects the interest of the bread winning people being paramount especially in such directions as these. But gradually all matters get into right course again.

This shows you how I always persevered to clear off any doubts.

What you just sent, dear Mr Rodway, is Isoelopsis graminifolia, which is not likely an introduced plant considering its companions there with you. We have under similar isolation also Euphorbia Drummondi in Tasmania. So it must be regarded as a remarkable addition to the Tasmanian Flora. Doubtless you will bring this under the notice of the next meeting of your R.S. I may mention that 3 years before Turczaninow published this from Drummond's W.A. collections, I had (in 1848) recognized this as a <u>new genus</u>, when exploring in S.A. but my manuscript at the then <u>war-time</u> was allowed to be left unpublished so that Turczaninow anticipated me. The name, which I had given was Rhizoclphalum.

He also served on the Legislative Council, was acting colonial secretary (1842-3) and held a number of minor government offices. ST MARY'S HOSPITAL, HOBART

1841 - 1862

St Mary's Hospital was started by Dr Edward Samuel Pickard Bedford (1809-1876), younger son of Rev.William Bedford. It opened on 1 January 1841 as a subscription hospital, especially for the 'labouring classes', under a committee of management, and 5 trustees, with Dr Bedford as medical officer. It was situated at first in Campbell Street but a new building was erected in Davey Street (corner of Davey & salamanca Place, later used as public offices) and opened about 1849. Bedford hoped in 1856 to make the hospital a training school but recognition was not granted by the Royal College of Surgeons and the hospital declined and was closed in 1862 owing to lack of financial support. Dr Bedford then moved to Sydney and became medical adviser to the N.S.W. government. Dr Bedford was a founder member and keen supporter of the Royal Society of Tasmania.

JOHN WATT BEATTIE

John Watt Beattie (1859 - 1930) who was born in Edinburgh, arrived in Tasmania in 1878 and settled at first in New Norfolk. He was a notable photographer, both of views and portraits, and acted as photographer to the Tasmanian Government, and also took over Ansons' photographic studios (1852) in Hobart (the Beattie studios were sold shortly before his death). Many of Beattie's photographs of people and places were published in the <u>Cyclopedia of Tasmania</u>, (1st edn. 1900). He also prepared sets of lecture slides on the topography and history of Tasmania and gave many lectures himself. He was interested in the history and made an important collection of items relating to Port Arthur & convict days, which was sold to the Queen Victoria Museum, Launceston in 1927. Another collection was secured for the Tasmanian Museum Hobart after Beattie's death through William Walker, the City paying £250. Some of Beattie's lectures and photographic notes were placed with the Royal Society's manuscripts on loan by the Museum.

Some other papers of J.W.Beattie were bequeathed by him to the Royal Society for safe-keeping. These consist of copies of historical manuscripts and some original manuscripts, press cuttings and notes. See RS.30

LETTER

15/1/79

Volunteer Hotel Brisbane St. Launceston

Dear Father

I sailed from Melbourne in the Mangana on Friday the 10th inst. for Launceston. We sighted the shores, or rather the hills of Tasmania next morning at about 7 o'clock. We were soon near the mouth of the river Tamar on which Launceston is built. My impression on first seeing Tasmania from the mouth of the river was anything but good. It is terribly mountainous and rugged. We passed George Town which lies at the mouth of the Tamar. It is a wretched little place built entirely of wood. It is scarcely a town only a small village. The river is very long and winding and high mountains runs on both sides all the way up to Launceston and they have no very great appearance speaking from an agricultural point of view, being very bare looking and rocky. Houses are dotted about far apart from each other all the way up on either side but there is very little done in the way of "taking in" or clearing the land in fact it is hardly possible to do it being so very hilly and rocky. We arrived at Launceston at 2 o'clock in the afternoon and I cant say it is a very pretty place as regards the houses and harbour works. After a deal of backing and manueuvering [sic] we at last got alongside the wharf. It is no harbour at all being only a part of the river with a platform for the vessles [*sic*] to lie alongside of and when the tide is down the vessles lie in the mud. Most of the houses about this quarter are very mutch out of repair and all seem to be very quiet as very little business was done. If Launceston is the business place of the island goodness knows what Hobart Town will be like. Launceston is surrounded by high hills and you see higher ones towering above the rest to the west and norwest of the island. Mr Ayre the farmer I told you about in my last letter lives at a little place they call St. Leonards about 3 or 4 miles to the east of Launceston. I took a walk out to him on Monday and found he had gone to town but he was expected home soon so I waited him. Mrs Ayre is a very nice lady as is also Miss Ayre who seems to live with them. I got my dinner there and Mr Ayre made his appearance. I gave him my letter of introduction from Mr Sturrock and he was very well pleased to see me. He is a very nice agreable man, and has several large places in NSW and Inland. He asked me your intentions when you come out here and on my telling him he said he would just give me his candid opinion. He said Tasmania is not the place to settle in with a view to better yourself. It would do very well with a man who had money and who was wanting to live quietly but to a person who had a little capital and who was wanting to increase it he strongly reccomended [sic] Adelaide or Queensland. He said all the good land of Tasmania was bought up, there was no doubt some good land in the bush but the cost of clearing it was very great in fact you can buy cleared land cheaper than you could the land under bush. And the price of manual labour was very high just now. A man gets some 40 to £50 per year and all found which he says eats up all the profits. He said it was all very well for the old colonists to thrive because they had the benefit of having convict labourers which only cost them £9 per year all found and they were splendid workers. But he said the best thing for you to do if you were bent on coming out to get a house in Melbourne (and you can live cheap there) where you could leave the family and take a run over to Tasmania and then you could judge for yourself whether you would settle in Tasmania or Australia. He said I should take a look through the island and he would give me letters to farmers who would give me as much information on the subject as could be got. Dear Father I must confess I was a little sorry to have all our fine dreams of settlement and the fine idea of the place we had, knocked to atoms but I have just told you exactly what I was told myself and what I had seen and thought because it wouldnt do for me to hide all these things from you and to bring you out here to be (God forbid) ruined. It would break my heart if you lost all through me. I have no doubt you will all be disappointed but I cant help it. There are great quantities of fruit grown in Tasmania but Mr Ayre says it dont pay as they are growing them cheaper in Australia than they can export them from

Tasmania. Tasmania is great in minerals but it needs such a lot of money to meddle with such things and money is thought little of in the colonies. For commerce this place is far back, it is just what a gentleman said who was travelling about "a regular dead and alive place". One time and at present there is a great cry about the mines but they will not last long and then Tasmania will fall asleep again for a another half century or so.

Dear Father I think my best plan is to go back to Melbourne again until I hear word from you whether you decide to come to Australia or stop at home. I will very likely get employment there in some shop. I liked the climate of Victoria well enough when I was there. It is hot no doubt, but the heat only lasts 1 or 2 months and then after that the weather is fine and agreable. Mr Miller has very likely written you and he speaks very highly of Australia as all other eperienced people do so it well may be just as well for us to settle there as it would be to settle in Tasmania. There is no chance of a job for me in Tasmania in the shop line but there are always openings in Melbourne. There were only three ships of any size lying at the wharf of Launceston in fact it wouldnt hold many more but there were 8 or 9 small smacks loading and unloading besides. The police force I am led to believe by a citizen amounts to the large number of 3 men and a seargent [sic]. The only defence against an enemy is some 40 or 50 raw volunteers and the four policemen which I have grave doubts about as to their fighting capabilities. In my next letter I will give you an account of the inland portion of the island although I am led to believe it is not much better than what I have seen. The climate I do not hesitate to say is good but Victoria is not far behind. The houses are all roofed with shingle that is thin pieces of wood about 4 x 8 and laid on the roof in the same way as slate, in fact you hardly know the difference between them. This mode of roofing is very dangerous because if any fire was getting in contact with it it would all go up in a blaze. It is not allowed in Melbourne at all for the above reason. Bullock teams are very common here, you see 6 or 8 bullocks attached to a cart loaded with logs of wood dragging it along slowly with the driver cracking his long whip about their ears. The railway travelling is very slow, 18 to 25 miles being the average rate the train runs at.

Dear Father I must say goodbye just now hoping to hear from you as soon as possible and to hear how I will act. Please address all my letters to Mr Miller. Give my best wishes to Grandma and Auntie and all the rest of them. I will write them all again next mail. I have sent some Tasmanian papers. I called at the immigration agent in Launceston to see and get as mutch information about as possible but I never found him, his office was always closed. I have no more at present but will write two or three times every mail.

CAPT. C.O'H. BOOTH - CODE OF SIGNALS

Capt. Charles O'Hara Booth (1800 - 1851) of the 21st Fusiliers was commandant of the Convict Stations on Tasman's Peninsula from 1833 until 1844 (Civil Commander of Port Arthur and Point Puer only from 1844). It was under his command that the township of Port Arthur was laid out. As commandant of convicts he was both efficient and impartial. The Lieutenant Governors Col. Arthur and Sir John Franklin both expressed great satisfaction after visits of inspection; Arthur describing him as 'kind, humane, active and most determined'. One of his main achievements was the establishment of a semaphore signalling system throughout the peninsula and also connected with Hobart. This provided a speedy means of communication, especially useful for notifying constable's posts of escapes of prisoners. For this purpose he drew up a code of signals.

In 1838 Booth was lost in the bush for 4 days which undermined his health. In 1844 he was appointed superintendent of the Queen's Orphan School, New Town.

Booth was born in Basingstoke, England in 1800. In 1838 he married Elizabeth Charlotte Eagle (referred to in his diary as Lizzie) step-daughter of Booth's regimental surgeon. They had two daughters, the elder, Amelia Patricia, born in 1839. After Booth's death in 1851 his widow returned to England and petitioned for a pension.

The extracts begin in October 1831, when it was rumoured that his regiment was to be sent to New South Wales, and the embarkation on 10 September 1832. Includes diary of sea voyage (crossing the line ceremony, behaviour of prisoners, etc.) and arrival in Hobart 2 February 1833. The diary includes references to his administration of the convict settlement at Port Arthur, visits to Point Puer, the mines (where he tested the coal and supervised the sinking of the shafts) and other stations of the Peninsula; his expeditions into the bush, his dogs, hunting, his garden, where he grew potatoes, convivial evenings with his friends the Lemprieres and their numerous children, visits to Hobart, Government House dinners (he describes Arthur's daughter as the Venus), inspections of the convict stations by the governors, Arthur and Franklin, the accession of the young Queen Victoria.

MITCHELL FAMILY OF LISDILLON

Sarah Mitchell, daughter of John Mitchell of Lisdillon, between Little Swanport and Mayfield on the East Coast of Tasmaine, was born in 1853, and kept a diary from the age of 13 until she died at ninetythree in 1946. In her later years, too, she kept scrapbooks in which she stuck, indéscriminately, early letters and memoranda of her family, photographs, newspaper clippings etc., which form an additional record, not only of her own life but of her parents and brothers and sisters.

Her father, John Mitchell, was the son of James Mitchell of St. German's, Cornwall, England, and came to Tasmania as a surveyor in 1837. He took a government post, and later became superintendent of boys at Port Puer, where he wrote a report on the health of the boy convicts in 1846 (RS. 32/35 p.42). His Cornish fiancee, Catherine -ugusta Keast, followed out in 1839, remembering her voyage to Tasmania as particularly unpleasant, through storms, a drunken captain and shortage The couple were married at Old Trinity Church, Hobart, before of food. settling at Port Fuer, where several children were born. Mitchell bought a farm at South Arm, but in 1852 he left his government post and moved to Lisdillon with his wife and five surviving children. There they remained, acquiring an extensive property for raising sheep, cattle, some arable crops and hops. Mitchell also served on Swansea Council and held a government post in the Post Office. He had charge of the Swansea mails, which gave him the privilege of franking his own mail.

The two eldest sons, Frederick Keast and Frank William Drew, were sent to England to complete their education in 1858. Both boys kept brief diaries of their voyage on the 'Derwentwater' via Cape Horn, and their first days in England, where they were met by their Keast relatives. At first they boarded at Sydenham School, near London, but later they moved to a grammar school near their relatives in Cornwall. Here Fred's delicate health became worse through the bullying (a letter from a schoolmate is reminiscent of <u>fom Brown's Schooldays</u> (RS.32/85 p.37) and he died in 1861 at the age of 18. Frank, however, went to Mannamead School in Flymouth, Devon, and did well in the British Civil Service examinations, being appointed to a post in Dublin, Ireland. In 1922 he built a house in Sussex, England, naming it Lisdillon after his childhood home.

The other two sons, Edwin and Mark, attended Horton College, Tasmania. Marx remained at home and worked Lisdillon, which he inherited. After his marriage to Mabel "iblin he lived at the Wattles,

- 1 -

a cottage on the property, as his mother remained at Lisdillon during her lifetime. Mark died in 1897, before his mother, leaving Lisdillon to his children It was advertised for sale, under the terms of his will, when the children were grown up, in 1913. His widow purchased it and remained there for a while, but the property was eventually split up. Edwin, after a spell in a job in New South Wales, settled at Mayfield, formerly part of his father's property.

The eldest daughter, ^Catherine Penwarne (Kate) married the Reverend John Aubrey Ball of Bright, Victoria, at St. John's Chørch, Buckland, in 1877 Jut died the following year and is buried at Buckland.

Of the two daughters born after the family moved to Lisdillon, the youngest, any Mary Jane, took a trip to England about 1872 and after her return married Herbert Giblin in 1877. Sarah Elizabeth Emma remained at home, apart from brief holiday visits to Hobart. Her father died in 1880 and Sarah looked after her mother at Lisdillon until Mrs Mitchell's death in 1899. Parah then took a holiday to stay with her brother, Frank, in Ireland and to see something of England and Europe, before she settled at Tirrzah, near Lisdillon, left to her by her father. In her later years she moved to Schouten House in Swansea with her neice, Trace Catherine, who took care of her. In 1937 she moved into the Westminster Rest Home, North Hobart, where she stayed until she died in 1946.

Parah started keeping a diary at the age of thirteen and continued until she was ninety-two, although for the last few years she had to dictate them to her neice, Grace. In her diaries she noted, daily the state of the weather and a record of the day's activities, such as helping with routine tasks about the house and property, planting or picking vegetables and fruit from the gardens (peas, lettuces, rhubarb, gooseberries, etc.) or visits to or from neighbours. Friends and neighbours mentioned include the gamilies of Cotton, Giblin, Lyne, Mayson, Meredith of Cambria and Shaw of Red Banks, Swansea. In her earlier years barah's routine was occasionally varied by a visit to Hokart or pic-nics on one of the several beaches near by, on the 'Fisherman's' or Pyke Island or at the Hop grounds during harvest time. Each year a 'hop feast' was given for the pickers when the hops were gathered in. In the earlier diaries, too, are frequent references to the horses and to rides to the 'Salt Works', where a wharf was built. 'he diaries are brief and purely factual; there is no attempt at description, even of less common events such as Government House dances. Even during her trip to Europe in 1900, lasting about eighteen months, Sarah recorded a daily routine often little different from her home life.

On board the 'Afric', on her way to England, for example, she thought the stewards were overworked and notes every day (except Sundays) that she helped to dry 400 knives. She also spent much of the day sketching, visiting the sick in the ship's hospital, or running a Sunday School for the children on board. In Europe she spent most of her time with her brother, Frank and his family near Dublin, and with them visited Killarney and other parts of Ireland. She spent a few weeks in London, seeing the Tower, St. Paul's Cathedral, "estminster Abbey and other sights, lunching, as she notes, on cocoa and bread and butter for $2\frac{1}{2}$ d. A production of <u>Julius Caesar</u> at a famous theatre, however, did not impress her, 'such a horrid 3/- spent, I trust no more theatres for me'. A tour of Continental Europe included Oberammergau where she saw the 'Passion Play 8 0'c. ; $1\frac{1}{2}$ hr. for dinner and 'til 5.30 pm. I went out 1,1/4 hr. during the crucifixion. The rest was wonderful, may God give me a blessing from it'. In Paris she took a flight in a balloon at the Exposition and went up the Eiffel Tower.

Miss Mitchell spent January and February 1901 in the Scilly Isles,

where she helped to tie up bunches of flowers for marketing. While there she noted the death of ween victoria and the proclamation of the Prince of Wales as King on 22 January 1901. She visited her Keast relations in Dewon and revisited her brother in Dublin, returning via the Isle Of Man, where she spent a few days before sailing to Falmouth, where she embarked on the SS.Oroya for the return journey to Tasmania.

Back in Tasmania, Miss Mitchell settled at Tirzah, near Lisdillon, on the East Coast and in her old age she moved to Schouten House, Swansea. She was a deeply religious woman and was known to stop cars on the ^Dwansea road to give the passengers a copy of ther text for the day. She was also hospitable and delighted to show visitors her collection of curios. Her lively interest in animals, botany, world events and especially intrepid travellers remained. In 1934, at the age of 80, she travelled to Melbourne by one of the first regular air passenger flights, boarding Capt. Holyman's plane at Swansea air field. Her range of other interests was reflected by the photographs, newspaper clippings and other souvenirs which she collected. These x in her later years she collected together and stuck, rather haphazardly, into scrapbooks together with some family records.

These scrapbooks, inspite of their lack of order, put life into the bare facts of the diaries by supplementing the information in a more interesting and visual way. Photographs, newspaper clippings, invitations, menus and other souvenirs illustrate events referred to in the diaries as well as Miss Mitchell's other interests.

One scrapbook contains sketches of family life drawn by the elder sister, Catherine Penwarne (Kate) between 1860 and 1875. Here we see the family enjoying pic-nics with the pet dog Caleb, or riding their horses -- in one sketch a guest is shown falling off her mount. Other sketches show some of the family in a gig crossing a river or in a boat rowing through the surf to Schouten Island. There is a lively scene of gay dancing at a 'hop feast' and another of more formal dancing at a social evening at Ted Banks (the home of the Shaw family).

Of more importance, perhaps, are the records of the early days of the family in ^fasmania, which were also put into the scrap books, mixed with other souvenirs. There is John Mitchell's brief diary of his voyage out and first days in Tasmania and a few letters of his, including a draft of his report on discipline at Port Puer (RS.32/85 p.42). There are also letters, journals and a school report of the two elder boys, Fred and Frank, which their mother had kept. Other miscellaneous items include a letter to Mrs (George) Meredith and advertigements for Mrs Charles (Louisa Ann) Meredith's books.

DIARIES OF SARAH E. E. MITCHELL 1866 - 1945

From the age of 13 Sarah Mitchell daily noted in her journal the state of the weather, her routine activities about the house and property, visits of friends, an occasional trip to Hobart, as in "ugust 1872, and her visit to Europe in 1900-1. The first three diaries are written in home made notebooks, the remainder in printed 'Letts' diaries. Some entries are 'cross written'. There is no diary for 1936.

Some of the journals include monthly cash accounts, mostly of small payments for such items as petticoats and gloves; also, for example in 1830, 'butter account' (including receipts, payments for carriage, etc.) and 'Kennedia' account (rent received, sheep bought from father, taxes, rates etc.).

MEREDITH LETTERS 1829 - 1835

Letters of Louisa Ann Twamley, née Meredith, of Edgbaston near Birmingham, U.K., and of her daughter Louisa Ann, to their Meredith relations in Tasmania. Mrs. Twamley's daughter, Louisa Ann, was born on 20th July 1812 near Birmingham. Louisa Ann distinguished herself as an authoress, publishing her first book at the age of twentyone. In 1839 she married her cousin Charles, and shortly afterwards the couple sailed for Tasmania. Here Louisa Meredith continued her literary career and wrote and illustrated many books based on her life in Tasmania, until her death in 1895.

She could earn floo p.a. as governness in Britain without the danger of a journey.

Miss Twamley refers to her mother's paralytic stroke. She is writing while the family is playing cards, she hates cards, 'so irrational a diversion.' Louisa Ann rejoices at Louisa's happy marriage. Refers to the influenza epidemic; their plans for excursions; ppactifing archery and her other cousins George, Sarah, Sabrina. She discusses political meetings in Birmingham - a 'great admirer of republicanism for a new country but cannot imagine it can agree with John Bull's long established nations.' Thanks for gifts of nautilus and a 'whale's eardrum' from 'dear Charles' and her younger cousins parrots.

George Meredith's Diary ' Letter 1821

George Meredith (1777 - 1856) was born near Birmingham, U.K. & served as a Lieutnant in the Marines until 1806 when he retired on half pay. He arrived in Hobart in March 1821 with his second wife Mary (nee Evans, d. 1842) and five children, and settled at Oyster Bay on the East Coast. Meredith established grazing stock and crops and also a flour mill and tannery at the Meredith River. In 1827 they moved to Belmont, a mile inland and in 1836 Meredith built a new home, Cambria, near their original settlement. (see Austn. Dic. of Biography)

Journal of William Pike 14 Aug. 1822 - 12 July 1823

The journal begins in England with preparations for departure, farewells and descriptions of Hythe, Dover, Deal. On 30 October 1822 W. Pike boarded the ship 'Thalia' (Capt. Munk) at Gravesend, with his wife, Nancy and five children (Lindly, Sarah, Eliza, Emma) and were seen off by his brother John. He describes the voyage and mentions fellow passengers including Mr & Mrs Graham and Mr Cruze, 'a pious man'. In Hobart he lodged at Mr Rayner's in Bridge Street in two large rooms for 2C/- per week and visited Mr Rayner's mill. Other people mentioned include: Mr Mather, Mr Hopkins, T. Gregson, Rev. Orton, Capt. Orton, Mr. Bromley and Mr Evans the Surveyor at New Town. He records his attempts to choose land and his Journey with Mr, Leake to Jericho where he settled.

The diary is entered in pencil or pen in a pocket notebook. At the back are pencil sketches of Porto Santo, Palma and Peak of Tenerife.

ARCHIBALD MECARTHUR d. 1847

Papers of the executors of Rev. Archibald Macarthur a Presbyterian minister who returned to England in 1836 leaving his affairs and three of his children, Mary, Henry William and John, in the care of trustees and guardians, namely John Walker, Henry Hopkins and John Geiss. The eldest son, Archibald, accompanied him to England where he apparently died before his father, who died in January 1847. JAMES BACKHOUSE CORRESPONDENCE

1831 - 1838

James Backhouse (1794-1869) was a Quaker missionary, of Darlington, and later, York, England. In 1831 he sailed for Australia, accompanied by George Washington Walker (1800-1859), with the financial support of the London Yearly Meeting. They arrived in Hobart in February 1832 and from then until their departure from Australia in 1838 they visited most of the scattered settlements throughout Australia. They spent three years in Van Diemens Land where they visited the penal settlements, reported to Lieut.-Governor Arthur on conditions and made suggestions for improvement of the prisons, chain gangs, assigned servants etc. They also encouraged the formation of benevolent services, such as the Ladies Committees for visiting prisoners on Elizabeth Fry's model, inspected hospitals and recommended humane treatment for the insane, as well as distributing religious tracts and school books. In 1833 they established a Monthly Meeting of the Society of Friends in Hobart and in 1834 the Hobart Yearly Meeting. In 1837 they bought property for a Meeting House in Hobart. James Backhouse also collected many botanical specimens and continued to correspond with the Tasmanian Society and the Royal Society. After his return to England, Backhouse published an account of his journeys as A Narrative of a Visit to the Australian Colonies (London, 1843) (See Australian Dictionary of Biography, Vol. 1.)

The correspondence consists of letters addressed to James Backhouse and his companion relating to their missionary journey. Most are from people in official positions thanking the missionaries for their work, acknowledging books and reports, replying to requests for information or offering introductions, help and hospitality and also some discussion of religious matters and references to botany in which J.B. was interested. A later letter of 1844 acknowledges Backhouse's gift of his book to the Tasmanian Society.

The letters were kept by the Backhouse family until 1933 when a grandson of James Backhouse, A.J. Crosfield, presented letters of Australian interest to the Royal Society of Tasmania through Ernest E. Unwin, headmaster of the Friends' School, Hobart. With them were a few other letters not connected with James Backhouse but of the same period and also of Australian interest. These (numbers 29-37) are mainly addressed to John Gould and refer to his study of Australian birds. It is unlikely that they were ever in the possession of James Backhouse who died some years before Gould, but they were probably collected by a younger member of the family. Apart from their interest in connection with John Gould and ornithology, many are signed by or include references to well known explorers. Many of the letters bear a pencil note in a later hand identifying the writer, often by a position or title received some years after the date of the letter.

About the time of their presentation to the Society the manuscripts were professionally guarded on to mounting paper and bound into a volume entitled "Autograph Letters". At the front, typed directly on to the mounting paper, is a list of the letters, probably copied by the binder from a handwritten draft as it contains a number of misreadings, such as Bushy for Busby, Benk for Back, Hirst for Stirt, Jawler for Gawler, etc. Also typed on to the mounting paper is an "introduction" by Mr. Unwin:-

"The letters contained herein are original autograph letters which have been preserved by the family of James Backhouse. They came into the possession of Albert J. Crosfield of Cambridge, England, a grandson of James Backhouse, on the death of his brother James Backhouse Crosfield, and were offered to the Library of the Royal Society of Tasmania through Ernest E. Unwin, Headmaster of the Friend's School, Hobart, who was consulted by Mr. A.J. Crosfield in the matter.

Most of the letters are addressed to James Backhouse or to James Backhouse and George Washington Walker from prominent people in this and mainland states mostly during the years 1832 to 1838. There are also a few letters addressed to other persons, which were probably collected by James Backhouse for their autographic value.

Harvest was abundant, especially maize, Mr. Maclean most zealous. Dr. Ellson well. New buildings, splendid new commissariat store and military barracks. Since Julia Leach left a handsome tomb placed over her husband. In a postcript dated 22 August, Anderson noted that they had waited for months for a ship to call and lacking supplies were reduced to drinking "pea coffee". He would be losing his brother in law, Mr. Campbell, Capt. Whipple and Robert Taylor.

Jospeh¹ Anderson (1790-1877), soldier, was Commandant of Norfolk Island March 1834 - Feb. 1839. John Leach who died on 14 Sept. 1835 of consumption was a Wesleyan minister appointed as catechist to the Penal Settlement after serving some years in V.D.L. James Backnouse had met Leach and his wife in Sydney on their way to Norfolk Island in June 1835

LETTERS TO JOHN GOULD

These letters were with the Backhouse correspondence when it was presented to the Royal Society of Tas. They have no connection with James Backhouse and their provenance is not known. They may have been collected by a later member of the Backhouse family. Most are connected not only with John Gould, the ornithologist, famous for his studies of birds but also with Australian and Arctic explorers.

John Gould (1804-1881) was appointed taxidermist to the Zoological Society, London, in 1823. In 1829 he married Elizabeth Coxen, a talented artist, who did illustrations for his earlier books. A Century of Birds from the Himalaya Mountains (1831-32), The Birds of Europe (1837) etc. He began work on Australian birds from specimens sent by his brothers-in-law Charles & Stephen Coxen who had property in the Hunter Valley, N.S.W. In 1838 he started on an expedition to Australia with his wife, one young son, and a zoological collector, John Gilbert, and a nephew, Henry Coxen. They landed first at Hobart in September 1838. From there John Gould visited New South Wales and South Australia while John Gibson went to Western Australia. During the latter part of their time in Hobart the Goulds stayed at Government House and another son was born, named Franklin after Governor Sir John Franklin. There are brief references to the visit in Lady Franklin's letters to her sister (RS.16/8) and Sir John's letters to his wife. For example when Gould returned in April 1839, from New South Wales where there had been a severe drought broken by flooding, Sir John wrote: "Mr. Gould has made large additions in N.S. Wales to his collection and therefore in high glee" (26 April 1839, RS.16/1) and "Mrs. Gould is getting on rapidly -Baby too" (17 May 1839 RS. 16/1). Later in 1839 the

Goulds moved to New South Wales to stay at the Coxen property. They left Sydney for England again on 9 April 1840 and publication of The Birds of Australia began at the end of 1840. Elizabeth Gould died on 15 August 1841 shortly after giving birth to her sixth child. (See <u>Aust. Dict. of</u> <u>Biography</u> vol. 1).

George Back, London, to Gould 8 May 1838

Offering an introduction to his "old friend" Sir John Franklin and sending regards to Captain Maconochie and his family. Addressed "Dear Sir" and endorsed "Mr. Gould".

Sir George Back (1796-1878) had served with Franklin on the Arctic expeditions and shared his interest in Arctic exploration. He was knighted in 1839, became a Fellow of the Royal Society and was appointed Admiral in 1857. Capt. Alexander Maconochie accompanied Lieut.-Gov. Sir John Franklin to V.D.L. as his private secretary (see also No. 32).

30 John Hutt, Perth, W.A. to [John Gould] 23 April 1839.

Thanks for letter and "the two numbers of your work on Australian ornithology" brought by "your Assistant Mr. Gilbert" and praising the "splendid work". Hutt would be happy to enroll himself amongst the subscribers. He comments on the present lack of scientific knowledge of Australia and would like "if ever you have leisure to use the quill feather of one of your captives to hear of your progress". Addressed "My Dear Sir".

John Hutt (1795-1880) served as Governor of Western Australia from January 1839 - February 1846. John Gilbert (c 1810-1845) was employed as zoological collector by Gould.

31 Charles Sturt to John Gould 19 Aug. 1839

The birds and trunk were going by the "John Pirie", only l egg of a sea bird. He would see to everything as he would have a deputy "by and by". Signed "C. Sturt", addressed "My Dear Gould" and endorsed John Gould Esq., Post Office, Sydney, readdressed to "Care S. Coxen Esq., Darlbrook, Hunters River".

Charles Sturt (1795-1869) explorer and public servant served as South Australian Surveyor General from March to September 1839. 32 Sir John Franklin to Capt. Nias 20 Aug. 1839

Introducing Mr. Gould "the distinguished ornithologist" although it was unnecessary as he was "in possession of an official letter from the Admiralty". As Gould and Mrs. Gould had been staying with Franklin he knew them to be "worthy persons ... zealous in their devotion to science". Lady Franklin and party had returned "last evening" - the ship reached within 10 miles of Cape Pillar 17 days before but was driven off by a gale". He was expecting "our friend James Ross" who had intended to sail in July and make V.D.L. his headquarters. Addressed from Govt. House V.D. Land to "My Dear Capt. Nias" H.M.S. Herald.

Sir John Franklin (1786-1847), naval officer and arctic explorer was Lieut.-Governor of Van Diemen's Land 1837-1843. Lady Franklin, his wife (formerly Jane Griffin (1791-1875) was a great traveller and the voyage referred to was probably her return from Sydney after some months travelling overland in Victoria and N.S.W. Captain Joseph Nias (1793-1879), Admiral 1867, K.C.B. 1867) was given command of the frigate Herald in 1838 to serve in the East Indies, including Australia, the Western Pacific and China. He had also served on Arctic expeditions, including the 1818 expedition under Sir John Ross, whose nephew James Clark Ross (1800-1862) was the discoverer of the magnetic pole in 1831. In 1838 James Ross was appointed to command an expedition to the Antarctic with the ships "Erebus" and "Terror" and discovered Mount Erebus, etc. He was knighted in 1843.

33 Sir George Gipps to E. Mayne 10 Sept. 1839

Introducing Mr. Gould who was "Proceeding on a scientific excursion to the Northern parts of the Colony". Addressed "My Dear Sir".

Sir George Gipps (1791-1847) was Governor of N.S.W. from February 1838-1846.

He would try to obtain a "skin of the kangaroo in question" but "the blacks here are very lazy". The large kangaroo was common there but he had seen none of the smaller kind; Edward Parry must have got his from the "New Mountains". He regretted Gould and Mrs. Gould had not time to visit Port Stephens. Signed (almost illegibly) Phillip P. King, written from Port Stephens, addressed "My Dear Sir". 35 (continued)

Phillip Parker King (1791-1856) naval officer and hydrographer, had surveyed the Australian coastal waters in the "Mermaid" and later the "Bathurst", 1815-1822, including Macquarie Harbour, Tasmania, in 1819, and also commanded the "Adventure" on the exploration of the south American coasts 1826-30. He was Commissioner of the Australian Agricultural Co. based at Port Stephens from 1839-1849. William Edward Parry (1790-1855), who had sailed on the Arctic voyages 1817-27 was an earlier Commissioner of the Australian Agricultural Co. 1829-34.

36 George Gray to John Gould 27 Dec. 1840

Had sent Gould natural history specimens collected on the north west coast of Australia and would like a descriptive list of these "as compared with the specimens from the S.W. which are likely to arrive immediately from S.[Swan] River". Addressed "Dear Sir" to "J. Gould Esq.", signed G. Grey.

Sir George Grey (1812-1898) after serving in the army in Ireland, led two expeditions to North West Australia, 1837-1839, to seek a site for settlement and in 1839 was appointed Resident Magistrate at King George Sound. On return to England in 1840 he wrote a "Journal of Two Expeditions of Discovery in N.W. and W. Australia during the years 1837-38" (London 1841). From 1841-45 he was Governor of South Australia, became Governor of New Zealand in 1845 and was knighted in 1848.

37 George Gawler to John Gould 22 Feb. 1842

Gawler's "packet of South Australian birds went with Mrs. Gawler to Derby" but she had just brought some of the best specimens to town to be stuffed. Gould might see them and might have them if "worth your acceptance", as duplicates were at Derby. Written from 33 Spring Gardens [London] addressed "My Dear Sir" to "John Gould Esq." and signed "Very truly yours George Gawler".

George Gawler (1795-1869) served in the army from 1810, was Lt. Colonel by 1834 and was Governor of South Australia 1838-1841.

34 Capt. John Lort Stokes to Gould ND. [c 1843-6]

Sending description of a Grey ibis shot on the N.W. coast of Australia in November 1839 and offering the head. Addressed "My Dear Gould".

Capt. John Lort Stokes (1812-1885) served on the expeditions of the "Beagle" and "Adventure" with Capt. P.P. King exploring southern America 1826-30. In 1837 he was appointed Lieutenant in the "Adventure" accompanying the "Beagle" on an exploratory expedition to Australia and in 1841 he succeeded another Stokes as Commander, returning to England in 1843.

The letter is undated but must be after his return to England in 1843.

James Barnard (\$809 - 1897) was the son of John George Barnard of Blackfriars, London, a printer and, arfreeman of the City of London Company of Stationers. James was apprenticed to his father to learn the printing trade in 1825. In 1838 he was appointed Government Printer, VDL. and arrived in Hobart with his wife and daughter on the <u>Pyramus</u> in March 1839. He lived and worked in Macquarie Street (Surrey House). A daily record kept by Mr. [T.S.] Stewart the officer left in charge of Norfolk Island after the convict station was transferred and before the arrival of the Pitcairn Islanders, entitled: "No.1 Norfolk Island Journal from 7 May 1855 - 31 January 1856".

This journal was written in great detail and records the daily life of the caretakers from the departure of Mr. Gaynor and part of the guard by the <u>Franklin</u> and the constables, Mr. & Mrs. Walker and family and others by the <u>Southern Cross</u>. Stewart records the poor state of stores, buildings, furniture and fences left, the daily employment of the remaining men, his problems over discipline and his relationship with the constables etc., especially sub-constable Daniel Farrell, and constables Rogers and Waterson; and Rogers in Cre killing sheep (1000 were to be slaughtered while in good condition) and boiling the meat for fat, the problem of drying sheepskins, the difficulty of keeping gardens and crops in a good state for the Pitcairners - he feared that the sweet potatoes might become extinct if not attended to, the Sunday divine service and attendance at it, the passing of ships, weather, fishing for salmon, etc.

WILLIAM GUNN

Wiiliam Gunn (1800-1868) was born in Ireland, the eldest son of Lt. William Gunn, whose younger son, fonald Campbell Gunn, also settled in Tasmania. William Gunn was a lieutenant in the Bourbon Regiment and arrived in Hobart in December 1822. He received a grant of 400 acres of land in the Sorell district. He was given occasional command of soldiers searching for bushrangers and in 1825 was wounded by a shot from one of Brady's gang and had to have his right arm amputated. In 1824 he was appointed superintendent of convicts at Birch's Bay (Channel). He was superintendent of the Prisoners' Barracks in Hobart from 1826 until 1846 when he was transferred to Launceston. He was appointed a justice of the peace in 1836 and served as a police magistrate in Launceston from 1850 until 1868. He married Francis Hannah Erndell at Sorell in 1829 and had six daughters and three sons, including William later Warden of Brighton, and James Arndell Gunn M.H.A.



LARGEBAAN & KENMORE ESTATES

Also references to 'constableship'.

At the back of the volume were entered journals of sheep owned by various people, including: James Robertson, Miss M. Ballentine, Miss M. P. Ballentine, Joseph Ballentine, Nelly Miller; noting marks, numbers of lambs, ewes, (gifts from D.B., Mr Downie & others).

This volume was probably kept by Duncan Ballentine, chief district constable and pound keeper at New Norfolk, who received a grant of land in the Derwent Valley above New Norfolk.

JAMES BELBIN

James Belbin was transported to N.S.W. in 1791, after conviction at the Old bailey, London, in 1739. Later he settled on Norfolk Island and received He and his wife, Ann Meredith, had six daughters, a grant of land. Mary Ann, Elizabeth, Sarah, twins Harriott and Catherine, and Susanna, and a son, James, between 1793 and 1803, but in 1805 his wife died in childbirth and the six year old twin, Harriott also died. In 1808 Belbin and his children, with the other Norfolk Islanders, were resettled in Tasmania, receiving supplies from the Government Stores. Eelcin may have been employed in the Stores as he noted in his memo.book the issue of stores to various ships and the inspection of the stores. He was twice arrested for remaining loyal to Governor William Eligh, deposed by officers of the New South Wales Corps, and for attempting to send an adaress to him in spite of Lt.Gov. Col. Fatterson's proclamation prohibitting communication with Eligh in 1809. In 1811 Belbin went to London to petition for restoration of his rights as a Norfolk Island settler and was granted a free passage back in 1813, land at Cambridge and Government victuals for eighteen months for himself, son James and his new second wife.

Pocket Book 1808 - 1810

Small memorandum book in leather pocket book. In this James Belbin moted his departure from Norfolk Island, arrival in Hobart on 3 October 1808, being victualled from the Government stores after having already received blankets etc. in Norfolk Island. He then noted the arrival and departures of ships, their cargoes and sometimes what provisions, etc were issued from the stores. He noted the arrival of Governor Bligh in the 'Porpoise'. Interspersed a bit haphazardly amongst theæ regular entries were personal memoranda, such as his arrest for support of Governor Bligh: 24 Apr. 1809 'Was forcibly dragged from my children and my dwelling by Mr Lord and a written address . . . of the loyal settlers . . . to W. Eligh . . . also forcibly taken . . .' He was discharged by Rev. Knopwood and Mr: Lord the next day on condition he did not write letters to W. Eligh, 'Mr Knopwood behaved as a gentlemen . . . Mr Lord turbulent and prejudiced . . . ' On 21st May 1809 Mr Knopwood read Col. Paterson's proclamation . . the same evening sent an address to H. E. Governor Eligh signed by many of the Norfolk settlers'.

The first entries, recording his arrival in 1808, are written on the back page, the regular entries of arrivals and departures of ships begin at the front of the volume. A few miscellaneous memoranda appear to have been entered at the back of the notebook (including a note ofrom <u>The News</u> of the trial of Governor Picton of Trinidad in the Court of Kings Bench 1806) or in any odd space, including the leather of the wallet (eg. a note that the Government cow shed built by Mr Lord had fallen down killing 12 cattle).

Inside the cover Belbin entered the dates of birth of himself and children and the death of his wife and a daughter at Norfolk Island

JAMES KELLY

James Kelly (1791-1859) was born in Paramatta, N.S.W., went to sea in 1807 and made several sealing voyages to the Bass Straits and New Zealand. In 1814 he was appointed master of the schooner "Henrietta" owned by T.W. Birch (1774-1821), a whaler and merchant of Hobart, and later commanded Birch's brig "Sophia". In 1818 he was engaged in searching the East Coast for escaped convicts and in 1821 in transporting convicts to Macquarie Harbour in the "Sophia". He was Harbour Master of Hobart from 1819-1829. He also engaged in whaling and sealing, had a small farm on Bruny Island and property in Battery Point, Hobart. He married Elizabeth Griffiths in 1812 and had ten children. (see A.D.B.vol.II, pp.36-37)

NARRATIVE OF A VOYAGE

"Discovery of Port Davey and Macquarie Harbour" and voyage round Tasmania by James Kelly in 1815-1816. N.D.

Narrative written and signed by James Kelly entitled "First discovery of Port Davey and Macquarie Harbour by James Kelly". The manuscript is undated but it was written some years after the events described, certainly after 1821, but probably this version was written for publication in the Hobart Town Courier in 1854. It was published serially in that paper, with only minor editorial corrections or footnotes, between 3 April and 14 April 1854 under the heading: "Some unrecorded passages in the history of Van Diemen's Land (from a Very Old Stager)".

The narrative is written in the third person and begins: "On the 12th of December 1815 James Kelly sailed from Hobart Town in a small sized open 5 oared Whale Boat to examine the then unknown West Coast of Van D. Land, accompanied by the following named four men as the crew: John Griffiths, a native of the Colony, George Briggs, ditto, William Jones, Englishman, Thomas Tooms, ditto". According to this narrative they arrived at the inlet, which they named Port Davey "in honor of the then Lieutenant Governor", on 17 December. They spent the following three days there, camping on a point on the north side of the inlet where they cleared 2 rods of scrub and planted garden seeds. They took soundings and made a sketch of the inlet's extent, naming the eastern arm, Bathurst Harbour in "honor of Lord Bathurst secretary for the colonies". They also caught a "great quantity of wild fowl, black swans, ducks and plenty of eels and fish".

They reached Macquarie Harbour on 28 December, naming it in "honor of the then Governor of New South Wales" and landed on an island which they named Elizabeth Island in "honor of Mrs. Gordon wife of James Gordon of Pittwater", and another island about 25 miles up the Harbour, was named Sarah Island

after the wife of Thomas William Birch of Hobart. They named the large fresh water river Gordon River "in honor of James Gordon, esq. of Pit Water, he having kindly lent his boat for this particular voyage of discovery round Van D. Land" and the inlet beyond "Birch Inlet" after T.W. Birch. They made a sketch of the harbour but found it to be a Bar Harbour only for vessels of a light draught. Kelly also noted plenty of Huon pine growing on the banks.

The voyage continued right round V.D.L., calling at the Hunter Islands and at George Town, where the commandant took them to be the bushrangers, Michael Howe and his fellows, until shown their port clearance. While sailing along the north east coast they met native followers of Lamanbunganah and later his brother Tolobunganah, friends of the crew member, George Briggs, a sealer. Women of the tribe helped them to catch seals, which the crew skinned, giving the carcasses to the tribe in exchange for kangaroo skins.

There are many references to meetings with large numbers of natives at most of their overnight camps, some friendly to whom they gave sugar or black swans, others hostile who threw spears and stones. Kelly refers to the great height of some of the men and describes some of their customs, such as trailing spears between their toes and eating vermin from their hair and beards.

This manuscript is written neatly in two notebooks composed of account ruled paper (39cm x 14cm) folded in the centre to form a booklet ("reporter's" notepad style) and 35 sheets were used. A few pages include a portion of the Britannia water-mark. Another, much briefer, manuscript is in the Mitchell Library, Sydney, and may be of earlier date. This contains some differences in the dates and events described and more precise details about wind and weather.

The narrative, as published in 1854, is obviously written long after the events referred to, shown by such references as Macquarie "the then Governor of New South Wales". There is indeed some doubt about the accuracy of the reminiscences. The editor of Historical Records of Australia, series III vol. II includes the following note (p.778, No.115)

In his evidence in 1820 before the commission of inquiry into the state of the colouy (see volume 111 of this series). T. W. Birch stated that he discovered Port Davey in the schooner Heuristia Pocket in the seur 1816; that he was accompanied by James Kelly; and that Kelly proceeded along the coast in a boat from Port Davey and discovered Macquarie harbour. Birch also stated that, as a reward for this discovery, he was granted by Governor Macquarie the exclusive privilege of obtaining Huon pine from Macquarie harbour for a period of one year. Kelly also gave evidence hefore the complexity of incurry but made up reference to any discoveries by the commission of inquiry, but made no reference to any discoveries by himself.

A manuscript is preserved in the library of the royal society of Tasmania, which is undoubtedly in the handwriting of James Kelly and written some time after the year 1821. In this manuscript, Kelly described a voyage in which hast best for any other than the base of th time after the year 1621. In this manuscript, iselfy described a vorage in a whale-hoat around Tasmania, and stated that he entered Port Davey on the 17th of December and discovered Macquarie harbour on the 28th of December, 1815. The manuscript begins with the account of the departure from Hobart town on the 12th of December, and terminates with the return to that town on the 50th of January following. A manuscript in the Mitchell library. Sydney, codtains a brief journal of the same voyage, but commences with the departure from Hobart town on the 15th of December, and terminates with the departure from Hobart town on

the 16th of December, and terminates with the return on the 24th of January. This manuscript is not in the handwriting of James Kelly, but is signed by him.

In a letter dated 11th April, 1816, preserved as the record office. London, T. W. Birch transmitted an account of this voyage, which records the departure from Hobart town on the 16th of December and the discoveries of Port Divey and Macquarie harbour on the 22nd and 36th of December, 1815.

It is impossible to explain satisfactority the discrepancies in these accounts.

Melville's Van Diemen's Land Almanack for 1833 includes (pp.161-162) a brief description of the discovery of Macquarie Harbour and Port Davey "furnished by the kindness of Kelly himself". This states that James Kelly sailed from Hobart "in a common sized open whale boat, accompanied by four men to row it", stayed three days at Port Davey, then went on west, and entered Macquarie Harbour on 28 December, remaining there five days, exploring and naming various points and then sailed round V.D.L. in 39 days. When examined by the Commission of Inquiry in 1820 Kelly made no mention of this voyage but stated that he had been seven times to Macquarie Harbour and was familiar with it and was questioned about Huon pine. He also stated that he had been employed in the Seal Fishery in Bass Straits for five years and had commanded a vessel in the seal and whale fisheries off the coast of V.D.L. for seven years. (H.R.A., III vol.III, pp.458-466). It seems probable that the 1854 "Old Stager's" narrative includes events and stories from other expeditions made by Kelly; for example clearing two rods of ground and sowing garden seeds at Port Davey seems a big task for a brief visit of five men in an open row boat. Some of the descriptions of natives and sealing and bushrangers, etc. may also be drawn from his experience as a sealer or his 1818 search for escaped convicts. The original discovery of Macquarie Harbour was probably as Birch states, made in a boat from the "Henrietta". Birch died in 1821.

The 1894 narrative from the Courier was reprinted in the Tasmanian Parliamentary Papers of 1881, including the editorial comments and corrections. J.E. Calder in presenting it in 1881 describes it inaccurately as the "log". The manuscript was transcribed and published in the Papers and Proceedings of the Royal Society of Tasmania for 1920.

A.G.WEBSTER

On arrival at Kangaroo Island he joined 'together two couple in Holy Matrimony', one being Mr Stephens 'our manninger' [Samuel Stephens (1808 - 1840), colonial manager of the South Australian Co., who married Charlotte Hudson Beare on 24 Sept. 1836]

The letter also describes Hobart, as compared with his first voyage there - 'all the place from around Battery Point around old Knopwood's place is made a fine wharf where ships lay alongside to load and unload'. He refers to the Roberts family: Roberts now dead and Mrs Roberts, with her daughters Caroline and Betsy keep a respectable boarding school for young ladies, Robert Roberts married to Miss Sherwin. Martin's sons Robert and George were to start school with Mr Giblin's father at Newtown.

TASMANIAN SOCIETY

The Tasmanian Society was founded by Governor Sir John Franklin in 1838. It had no definite name, however, until 1842 when it was referred to in its journal, <u>The Tasmanian Journal of Natural Sciences Agriculture</u>, <u>Statistics etc</u>

The first secretary was Ronald Campbell Gunn, Private Secretary to Sir John Franklin, succeeded in 1841 by the new Private Secretary, Francis Hartwell. The Rev. Philip Gell (who came to act as headmaster to the proposed new college) became secretary in 1842.

On 3rd October 1843 the new Governor Sir Eardley Wilmot was elected president but on 14 October 1843 he convened a meeting with the object of amalgamating with the Horticultural Society and the Mechanics Institute. All except five members withdrew, accepted the resignation of Sir Eardley Wilmot and re-elected Sir John Franklin as President. The Society then centred itself on Launceston where Ronald Gunn continued publishing the Tasmanian Journal, the last volume being number 3 (1846-1849). The Journal contains minutes of meetings, the last being 10 May 1848.

In 1847 an unsuccessful attempt was made to unite with the new Royal Society of Tasmania and in 1849 the rules of the latter Society were altered to allow easy election of members of the Tasmanian Society.

JOHN INGLE

John Ingle (?1781-1872) was a merchant and shipowner who had sailed with David Collins' expedition, arriving in 1804. He received a grant of land near Bagdad and acquired further property in Hobart and elsewhere. He was a friend of Edward Lord who was a fellow traveller on the Collins voyage, as was James Hobbs whose sister, Rebecca, Ingle married in 1804. In 1818 John Ingle left Tasmania and sold some of his property to Edward Lord but retained some property and commercial interests. Back in England he married Sophia Currey, whose family were bankers.

INGLE -

Letter written from Hobart to John Ingle, London:- depression in monetary, commercial and agricultural interests, affairs of Montefiore, Bryant, Hopleys (and their agent Hobbs).

The writer also attempted 'from recollection a sketch [plan] of your property in Argyle and Macquarie streets showing the present improvement' of new wharves reclaimed from the sea and the extension of Argyle Street cut through Government House gardens, and also the old police office on the corner which belonged to the Gellibrand's trustees but was up for sale, being in a dilapidated state, and would be a valuable site for shops or stores.

The letter is torn and a piece is missing with the signature, but it may have been written by Edward Lord.

Memorandum of a voyage to Van Diemen's Land 1822

Peter Harrisson arrived in V.D.L. via the Macclesfield on 8.9. 1822. He received a grant of 2000 acres at Oatlands. lived at Grove House, Jericho, married Mary Lloyd Owen of Jericho and died on 20 July 1869 aged 78.

1 Journal or memorandum written by Peter Harrison concerning his voyage to V.D.L. and his arrival there and entitled: 'Memorandums of a voyage to Van Dieman's [sic] Land by Mr P. Harrisson, commenced February 1st, and his arrival there September 8th, with such observations as may prove useful to future emigrants'.

The journal is written in the form of a letter to 'Charles' and contains lively memories of an uncomfortable voyage 'steerage', on which two passengers were arrested for debt (one at Dover and one at Cork, Ireland, by officers from Bow Street). In V.D.L., his 'general observations, Nov. 1822' include a favourable report of the weather, the fertility of the soil and prospects for agriculture, together with a note of prices of grants of land and specimens of the certificates necessary, also a note of costs of equipment and comments on types of sheep. Amongst other general advice he notes the necessity for bachelors to learn to cook and make bread. He also comments on the prospect of the establishment of a criminal court and supreme court and refers to life in Hobart, the appearance of aborigines, etc.

Annual Report

The Annual Meeting was held in the Society's Room, Tasmanian Museum and Art Gallery, Hobart, on the 11th March, 1940.

The following Office-bearers were elected:-

Under the Society's Rules Dr. W. L. Crowther retired from the office of Vice-President, and Mr. E. E. Unwin was appointed in his place (retiring 1942).

Treasurer: Mr. S. Angel.

Dr. W. L. Crowther (retiring 1943).

Mr. A. L. Meston (retiring 1943).

Mr. N. P. Booth was elected to the Council to sit for the unexpired portion of Mr. Unwin's period, namely, one year.

The Council made the following appointments at its first meeting:---

Secretary and Librarian: Dr. Joseph Pearson.

Assistant Librarian: Mrs. Clive Lord.

Standing Committee: Dr. W. L. Crowther, Dr. A. N. Lewis, Dr. V. V. Hickman, and the Secretary.

The Council elected the following two Trustees to serve on the Board of Trustees of the Tasmanian Museum and Art Gallery and the Botanical Gardens in accordance with the amended Tasmanian Museum and Botanical Gardens Act:----Mr. W. H. Clemes and Dr. A. N. Lewis.

Ten meetings were held during the year (see proceedings for abstract of papers). In addition scientific papers were submitted for publication and have been printed in the present volume.

Library

It was agreed, on the recommendation of the Council, to make the following change in the hours of opening the Society's Library:---

That members make use of the Library for reading purposes only when the Assistant-Librarian is present at the following times:---Mondays, 10 a.m. 1 p.m.; Wednesdays and Fridays, 10 a.m.-1 p.m., 2-5 p.m.; on the evening when a General Meeting is held, 7.30-8 p.m.

During the year 330 volumes were added to the Library in addition to a number of reports and pamphlets from British and foreign countries. The number of Institutions on the Exchange List for the year was 278, being made up of 13British, 53 American, and 94 from other parts of the world. The Library no consists of 19,889 volumes.

BOTANICAL GARDENS

See also minutes of Council Meetings.

The Botanical Gardens was originally one of the main functions of the Royal Society (first called the VDL Society for Horticulture, Botany and the Advancement of Science). The founder of the Society in 1843, the Lieutenant Governor, Sir John Eardley Wilmot, handed over to the Society 14 acres of the Colonial Gardens on the Queens Domain to be developed as Botanic Gardens on the lines of the Botanic Gardens at Kew and promised a grant of f_{200} a year. It was originally intended that a secretary with scientific knowledge of the leading branches of Natural History should be appointed, at a salary of not less than £200 p.a. with house, and he would be responsible for the Gardens. Indeed the Society hoped to appoint Joseph Hooker, son of William Hooker the botanist. In 1844 the Government grant was raised to f400 p.a. and Dr. G.F. Story was appointed Secretary at f200 p.a. The head gardener, Herbertson, a former Government House Gardener, succeeded in June 1844 by George Grant, was to take instructions from him. From the end of 1845, however, the Government grant was reduced again to £200. The Society then proposed to appoint a 'practical botanist' who could take charge of the Gardens and also act as secretary, and wanted to appoint F.W. Newman, who arrived from Sydney in September 1845 as head gardener, as secretary. The Governor pointed out that such an appointment was 'inconsistent with the objects of the Society' as a 'secretary to a learned and scientific institution' should be a person 'of superior education and scientific and literary acquirements' (minutes Oct. 1845). Accordingly an Honorary Secretary, Rev. John Lillie, was elected to succeed Dr. Story from December 1845 and F.W. Newman was appointed Superintendent of the Gardens at f80 p.a. (raised in 1848 to f120). Newman died in August 1859 and Francis Abbott junior, who had served an apprenticeship under Newman from 1852 and been employed in the Gardens, was appointed Superintendent and remained until his death in 1903.

In 1885 the Gardens and Museum were transferred to the State under a Board of Trustees consisting partly of Government officials and partly of members of the Council of the Royal Society. In 1950 a new Board was established for the Botanical Gardens consisting of 4 Government nominees and representatives of the City Council, Royal Society and University of Tasmania.

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1 Accounts 1845 - 1851

Superintendent and remained until his death in 1903.

Accounts of sales of plants May - Oct. 1845 and expenses from 1 December 1845 - September 1851. The monthly expense accounts kept by F. W. Newman, superintendent, are detailed, including his own salary (at £80 p.a. or £120 p.a. from 1848), wages and rations for men, named, and the convict probationers, freight on plants sent or received by sea, hay and straw, for horse, attendance at gardens, flower pots, manure, fence round propagating garden, propagating house (1848), canvas for band stand shade, straw for fruit, tobacco for men trenching, '12 turns water'. The accounts are signed as 'settled' each month by F. W. Newman. Occasionally notes of mone. received and paid into bank on account of fruit.

Note. This volume was originally started in March 1845 as record of fruit and plants sold or sent out of the gardens and plants received entered in a small neat hand, but not continued.

These are entered in great detail and are very informative, including supplies such as garden baskets, gloves, blankets for the men, soft soap for washing trees, pots, candles, meat and groceries for rations for men, tobacco for men trenching, extra labour for trenching old propagating ground, paid man overtime for mowing grass, Mr. Abbott for repairing clock; also wages of men named and convict probationers and after 1858 more free men. Francis Abbott received rations as an apprentice from 1852 and in 1855 received a full wage of £6 per month. He left in May 1856 but returned at intervals later. There are also regular payments for freight on plants sent or received (e.g. Geelong Aug. 1856 Adelaide etc.) Accounts are signed as settled by F. W. Newman. The last entry is dated 27 August. The total for August plus an additional £10 as 20 per cent of sales due to Superintendent was paid to Mrs. Newman on 4 Oct. 1859 (after Newman's death). Remainder of volume blank.

August 1858 'We have had a very wet month... There has been scarcely any work done on the borders. The Prisoner men... have been all sent in... the Garden is beginning to put on its spring face... making great headway grafting...' At the end of the volume (turned reverse way) is a 'Calender of operations in the Nursery Garden' referring to 'the garden bought of Mr. Hollinsdale in Proctors' Road.* This runs from 25 April 1859 until August 1859, with a brief entry for September in a different hand.

This volume is presumably the 'work book' laid before the Royal Society's Council meetings by the Superintendent of the Gardens, together with accounts, numbers of visitors, etc. (see minutes for 1858). Most of the entries appear to have been copied by a clerk, not written by F. W. Newman, the Superintendent, himself. After Newman's death another clerical hand wrote at the front of the volume: 'Mr. Newman died Aug. 23/59 aged 63'. Then the volume appears to have been used as a memoranda book for notes on gardening, mainly taken from the Gardeners' Chronicle or Cottage Gardener, including notes on packing seeds, the effect of the colour of walls on ripening fruit, grafting, steam engine cultivation, new and recommended species of plants, notes of seeds needed, etc. An index of these notes was begun but only continued for a few pages. At the back of the volume are notes on the history of the gardens up to 1858. The earlier entries are in a small, neat, clerical hand, but later entries in a more cursive hand thought to be that of Francis Abbott, junior, who succeeded F. W. Newman as Superintendent and remained until his death in 1903. (account ruled volume, 330mm x 140mm x 30mm, half bound leather)

Library

It was agreed, on the recommendation of the Council, to make the following change in the hours of opening the Society's Library:---

That members make use of the Library for reading purposes only when the Assistant-Librarian is present at the following times:---Mondays, 10 a.m. 1 p.m.; Wednesdays and Fridays, 10 a.m.-1 p.m., 2-5 p.m.; on the evening when a General Meeting is held, 7.30-8 p.m.

During the year 330 volumes were added to the Library in addition to a number of reports and pamphlets from British and foreign countries. The number of Institutions on the Exchange List for the year was 278, being made up of 13British, 53 American, and 94 from other parts of the world. The Library no consists of 19,889 volumes.

Note. This volume was originally started in March 1845 as record of fruit and plants sold or sent out of the gardens and plants received entered in a small neat hand, but not continued.

Francis Abbott received rations as an apprentice from 1852 and in 1855 received a full wage of £6 per month. He left in May 1856 but returned at intervals later. There are also regular payments for freight on plants sent or received (e.g. Geelong Aug. 1856 Adelaide etc.) Accounts are signed as settled by F. W. Newman. The last entry is dated 27 August. The total for August plus an additional £10 as 20 per cent of sales due to Superintendent was paid to Mrs. Newman on 4 Oct. 1859 (after Newman's death). Remainder of volume blank.

August 1858 'We have had a very wet month... There has been scarcely any work done on the borders. The Prisoner men... have been all sent in... the Garden is beginning to put on its spring face... making great headway grafting...' At the end of the volume (turned reverse way) is a 'Calender of operations in the Nursery Garden' referring to 'the garden bought of Mr. Hollinsdale in Proctors' Road.* This runs from 25 April 1859 until August 1859, with a brief entry for September in a different hand.

This volume is presumably the 'work book' laid before the Royal Society's Council meetings by the Superintendent of the Gardens, together with accounts, numbers of visitors, etc. (see minutes for 1858). Most of the entries appear to have been copied by a clerk, not written by F. W. Newman, the Superintendent, himself. After Newman's death another clerical hand wrote at the front of the volume: 'Mr. Newman died Aug. 23/59 aged 63'. Then the volume appears to have been used as a memoranda book for notes on gardening, mainly taken from the Gardeners' Chronicle or Cottage Gardener, including notes on packing seeds, the effect of the colour of walls on ripening fruit, grafting, steam engine cultivation, new and recommended species of plants, notes of seeds needed, etc. An index of these notes was begun but only continued for a few pages. At the back of the volume are notes on the history of the gardens up to 1858. The earlier entries are in a small, neat, clerical hand, but later entries in a more cursive hand thought to be that of Francis Abbott, junior, who succeeded F. W.
