Attended University for one year only, 1933 "I and at least 2 others in this city were permitted to do the first 3 years of the course here . .".

Coached in Arts subjects by former school teachers and then in Law by Dr. Tyson, a solicitor. Sat for all exams in Launceston. Spent a year in residence at old Christ College. "I saw very little of the University" - lectures at 8 a.m. and 5 p.m. only. Articled to Hobart law firm.

"We had no professor that year - he had been I believe dismissed - this was the late Professor McDougall". "There was no fulltime member on the staff of the Law School".

Only 6 doing final year Law at the time. (named - Crisp, Fagan, Stokes, Mills, McPhee)

No compulsory religious observances in College.
